Heads Up from the Head of School--Three Basics Every Child Needs!

Nurture Children need enough nurture to make them feel they are part of something – family, school, and a wider community – but not so much that they are smothered or spoiled. They also need to feel confident that they are treasured for who they are, not what they are supposed to be becoming. **Structure** Children

need boundaries, a sense of what is and what isn't permitted, especially in regard to how to treat people. Where the boundaries lie is not as important as the fact that they exist and are non-negotiable. **Latitude** Children need freedom to learn from experience. Just as parents need to protect their children from danger, they also need the patience and confidence to let kids struggle at times.
